ATLANTA IS AMERIKKKA — BUILD THE ANTI-WHITE SUPREMACIST STUDENT'S  
PROGRAM AT THE MONCADA LIBRARY

What's happening in Atlanta really shows what AmeriKKKa is all about. If it was 27 white children who were killed, more white people would be outraged and the U.S. government would be terrorizing the Black community in the name of finding the murderer. Instead they are trying to stop the Black community patrols in Atlanta and even tried to blame the mothers for the deaths of their own children.

But this is not only happening in Atlanta. It is happening in Brooklyn too. Chino Mendez was brutally murdered in Sunset Park in March by the police - killer cops. The Klan is building quickly and the U.S. is doing nothing to stop it. In fact the KKK says Reagan is running the U.S. the way they would. The Klan and the police are trying to recruit young people into this too.

The government is building the cops and the Klan and is also sending mercenaries to Namibia and El Salvador to defend their empire of imperialism and white supremacy. Namibia is the real name of "South West Africa." The Black people there are fighting against the illegal holding of their land and lives by the colonizing whites of South Africa. The U.S. just asked a leader of South Africa to come here and is supporting the racist government by sending arms, money and weapons and mercenaries to try to stop the liberation forces. The liberation forces are the women, men and young people of Namibia under the leadership of their revolutionary party, SWAPO. Young people at the ages of 13 and 14 have run away to join the liberation armies so that they and their families can have a better education and life. Young women in particular are struggling to break away from traditional roles and expectations and to be able to be fully involved in their nation's liberation struggles. This is true all over the world such as in El Salvador and in this country.

Here in AmeriKKKa young people are faced with killer cops, young people are faced with bad education and drugs. When young people look for a way to have a better life, the U.S. government is saying that young people should join the Klan youth corps, the army or police patrols like the SCAN youth patrol in Park Slope. We are saying that young people can join the program at the Moncada Library to fight white supremacy. Young people can support the Black people of Atlanta. We think that should be at the heart of our young people's program.

The young people's program is going to be at the march to "Rendezvous for Life's Sake" in Washington, D.C., on Monday, May 25th, which is led by the Committee to STOP Children's Murders — a committee of the mothers of the children who have been murdered in Atlanta. The mothers say that the focus will be to draw attention to the needs of children and support children everywhere, as well as in Atlanta. We want to go there as the "Clifford Glover Young People's Contingent." (Clifford Glover was a 9-year old Black child, murdered by killer cop Thomas Shea in Queens in 1973; Shea said he thought Clifford "had a gun".) We want other young people in Brooklyn to go with us to Washington to take a stand against white supremacy and the terror attacks on young Black people, and you can come on a bus with us, just call us at the Library. Young people should be fighting racism and the Klan in our schools. There should be an anti-draft movement built in this country that says young people won't join the white supremacist wars of AmeriKKKa.

The Young People's Program at the Moncada Library is having an after-school program because young people need to talk about these things. It is a four week program, Thursday afternoons at 4 p.m.:

- May 28th — Atlanta; the leadership of Black people in this country in the fight against white supremacy; and the revolutionary leaders of the Black liberation struggle today like Assata Shakur.
- June 11th — The Klan in our schools, and how to fight against that; the important role of young people fighting for revolutionary change all over the world and here.
- June 25th — Building a revolutionary anti-draft movement and supporting the struggle for national liberation.. We want to talk about the current struggles in El Salvador and Namibia and Puerto Rico.
- July 9th — Drugs, racist education and the struggle against genocide and attacks on youth, particularly young women.
